PREA Standards on Inmate Education

Intake Education Standards (§115.33a)

During intake, you must provide inmates with information explaining:

- the agency's zero-tolerance policy regarding sexual abuse and sexual harassment
- 2. **how to report** incidents or suspicions of sexual abuse/harassment





PREA Standards on Inmate Education

Comprehensive Education Standards (§115.33b)

Within 30 days of intake, an agency must provide comprehensive education to inmates either in person or by video regarding:

- 1. their rights to be free from sexual abuse and harassment
- 2. the right to be free from retaliation for reporting such incidents
- 3. agency policies and procedures for responding to such incidents





PREA Standards on Inmate Education

Ongoing Education Standards (§115.33c)

Current inmates who have not received such education:

- shall be educated **within one year** of the effective date of the PREA standards
- shall receive education upon transfer to a different facility to the extent that the policies and procedures of the inmate's new facility differ from those of the previous facility



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PREA Standards on Inmate Education

Accessibility (§115.33d)

The agency shall provide inmate education in formats accessible to all inmates, including those who are limited English proficient, deaf, visually impaired, or otherwise disabled, as well as to inmates who have limited reading skills.







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PREA Standards on Documentation

Documentation of Inmate Education(§115.33e)

 The agency shall maintain documentation of inmate participation in these education sessions.

PREA Standards on Documentation

Strategies for Intake:

- · Provide intake education at a time and place where other information is being presented
- · Show the video at a time when all inmates are waiting for the next step in intake
- Find the place that is easiest for your staff and least intrusive to your process
- Technology or paper sign-in sheet

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Strategies for Comprehensive:

- · Ducat system
- · Before a scheduled medical assessment
- · Evaluations as proof of attendance
- Technology/Database

PREA Standards on Supplemental Information

Inmate Education Standards (§115.33f)

In addition to providing such education, the agency shall ensure that key information is continuously and readily available or visible to inmates through posters, inmate handbooks, or other written formats.



Video Delivery Methods

The video can be used in any of the following ways:

- · Staff or Volunteer Facilitated
- Inmate Peer Educator Facilitated
- · Video Alone (for Intake and/or Comprehensive Education)

We strongly encourage you to screen the video with a facilitator.



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Video for Intake Education

The first section of the video can be used at intake and gives an overview of:

- 1. Zero Tolerance
- 2. Inmates' rights to be free from sexual abuse/harassment
- 3. How to get help
- 4. Reporting

If you are using the video for intake education ONLY, you can stop or pause after this section at the 3:14 timestamp.





Video for Comprehensive Education

Purpose of the video:

- · Basic information
- Agency Zero Tolerance Policy
- Dynamics and definitions of sexual abuse and harassment in detention
- · How to Get Help

If you are using the video for your comprehensive education program, play the entire 16-minute video.

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


Section 5: What to Remember

Key takeaways:

- Agency's zero tolerance policy
- Right to report safely, privately, and through multiple channels
- Right to free medical and mental health care
- Sexual activity between staff and an inmate is illegal and never consensual
- Right to be free from sexual abuse





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Facilitator's Guide

Video is accompanied by a guide that gives information on:

- How to tailor the video to fit your facility's needs and current policies/procedures
- · Outlines for supplemental materials

The facilitator's guide and video will be available on the PREA Resource Center's website.





Customizing the Video to Your Facility

Ways to Customize:

- Use the Facilitator's Guide to provide specific information about your facility at the end of each section or at the end of the video
- Develop video segments that can be inserted after each section
- Look at your population to inform your supplemental materials
 - These should accompany the video and be available elsewhere





Other Considerations

For Inmates with Limited English Proficiency:

- For common languages, consider recording an audio track that can be listened to on headphones
- Translate all written materials into common languages
- · Use language lines and interpreter services





Other Considerations

For Inmates who are Deaf of Hard of Hearing:

· The video is closed captioned

Additional accommodations:

- Provide written materials in simple language or the full script of the video
- Make certain that facilitators are aware of relay lines and interpreter services





Other Considerations

For inmates who are visually impaired:

- · Check for understanding
- Offer the opportunity to watch/listen to the video again
- Provide supplemental materials in Braille or use reading services





PREA Standards on Inmate Education

For inmates who are developmentally disabled:

- The video is in fairly simple language, but it is a good idea to have a facilitator or mental health or education staff member check for understanding
- Make sure that supplemental materials have just a few key points in bullet format and in as simple, plain language as you can
